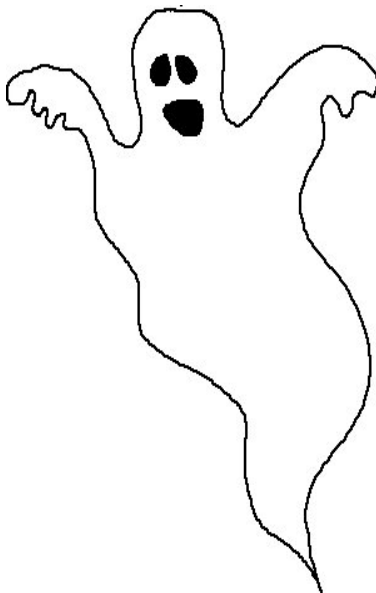

As a young child, I was always fascinated by history, more specifically the history of the United States. As I grew into adulthood, almost there now, I noticed that some things were not always what they seemed. Case in point, the story of the Paul Revere. As adolescents, we learn about how Paul Revere and his cronies warned the citizens of the greater Boston area about the British arrival. Why do we think this? The opening line of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's *The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere* states, "Listen my children and you shall hear; Of the midnight ride of Paul Revere." Lyrically amazing, factually inaccurate.

Longfellow wrote this in 1861. Does that year sound familiar? The United States was on the brink of the Civil War. What better way to ring up support, than write a patriotic ballad. Our current beliefs about the origins of the American Revolution were based on this poem. Any listener of pop music today will inform you about the importance of a rhyme scheme. Revere gets all the credit for sounding the proverbial alarm due to his last name rhyming with hear. Revere rode with about 40 or so other individuals to do the warning, and Revere made it about 20 miles. He went less than a marathon...on a horse. Also, around a quarter of the population of the colonies were

loyal to England. It seems to me that the easiest way to get caught on your espionage mission would be to yell, "The British are coming." It probably would have been more discreet to have codes of warning.
